




St. Monica Roman Catholic Church of Rochester Vision and Mission

Preparing for Christmas: Hectic or Holy? (Hints for Survival)

"I'll be so glad when Christmas is over! I'm so stressed—haven't finished getting gifts, or baking cookies, or decorating the house---I don't have enough hours in the day! I'm already exhausted". Bummer. Can you relate?

It's easy to get so busy preparing everything that you miss the peace and maybe the point of Advent. There are two major steps we can take beforehand that will help us:

1. Prioritize. What parts of your traditional celebrating are most meaningful to you? When I was a child, each evening my Mom would put beautiful Christmas carols on the phonograph and turn out all the lights except on the Christmas tree and the candles in the window. We'd all sit in the warm glow of the lights, the shimmer of the tinsel and the beautiful music. This is the image of Christmas I remember most (it was also unknowingly my first introduction to contemplative prayer). To this day, this tradition remains the center of my home celebration filling my spirit with peace.

What has the deepest meaning for you? Set aside the rest of your ideas of what Christmas should look like and focus on the grace of the season.

- 2. Budget for your three expenditures:
- Time—how much time do you have? What are the most important things to do with that time? What can you skip or delegate? Include quiet time for prayer and to savor the season.
- Energy—realistically, how much energy do you have? Where do you want to spend it? (If you're not sure of the answer, how much did you do last year before you were exhausted?)
- Money— Before the late 19th century, the only gifts in children's stockings were candy, nuts and maybe an orange (an exotic treat!). The ideal of piles of presents under the tree grew during the 20th century in step with commercial advertising. So perhaps it's time to step back a bit and focus on the real treat you could give; it may be something that costs no money at all!

Our December Blue Bag collection will be in the form of Christmas meals provided to SWEM. Finally, if you are able, you can write a check made out to SWEM to cover perishable expenses for the Christmas meal.
