Creation Corner

Like Jesus, Sister Dorothy Stang knew they were going to kill her if she continued to work on behalf of her people, continued to work toward her vision, and for our helpless planet. There was never a question that she would continue with that work.

For almost 40 years, Dorothy Stang, an American and a Sister of Notre Dame de Namur, worked in the "Wild West" of Brazil, at one with "her people": fighting for the rights and happiness of "the poorest of the poor." Her energy was boundless. Her devotion single-minded. Her heart open and trusting. She was, by all accounts, creative, savvy, fearless, and stubborn as a mule.

After years of witnessing the land wars, the devastation of the rainforest, and the dead-end lives of the poor, it became increasingly clear to Dorothy that the traditional practices of slash-and-burn agriculture were unsustainable and that a totally new way of working with the land was needed. She needed to help create a new relationship with the earth and with each other.

Sister Dorothy Stang was murdered in the early morning of Feb. 12, 2005. Her killers intercepted her on her way to prepare for a meeting to talk about the future of the Esperanca project of sustainable development. "We've worked hard for this moment," she had told the settlers the night before, "and now we can all take a little time out together to dream." Confronted by the two men pointing the gun at her, Dorothy pulled out her Bible, calmly opened it and began to read: Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God. Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth. Blessed are they who hunger and thirst after righteousness." The silence of the forest was shattered by the gunshot and Dorothy fell to the ground.

Global Witness reports in the past decade 1,733 people protecting rights to land and environment around the globe were murdered. Just 1% of the perpetrators have been convicted.

Let us pray remembering Dorothy Stang's words, "Only a profound change in our way of living - our values and attitudes - can bring new life to our world. Together we can make a difference bringing peace, joy, caring, love to our world that is losing sight of our guiding star- the goodness of the real God."

Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful. Enkindle in us the fire of your divine love. Send forth your Spirit and we shall be recreated and you shall renew the face of the earth.

Recognizing Black History Month, here is a well-known businessperson who is a living part of Rochester's Black History and resides just a block from our church.

Pollocks Alternator & Starter, at 271 Genesee St., has been the neighborhood's go-to place for car troubles for the past 38 years. Owner Lonnie Pollocks repairs all kinds of minor problems in his neat one-bay repair shop.

A young Lonnie Pollocks was part of the Great Migration, coming from Sanford, FL. Rochester's treatment of Black arrivals was harsh, but his mechanical skills landed him a job at Delco. He learned everything about automotive electrical

systems, and in 1985 opened his own business.
