

Denver's Angel of Charity, Julia Greeley, was born into slavery at Hannibal, Missouri, between 1833 and 1848. As a young child, Julia's right eye was destroyed by a cruel slavemaster's whip. Freed by the Emancipation Proclamation in 1853, Julia subsequently earned her keep by serving white families in Missouri, Wyoming, New Mexico and Colorado — though mostly in the Denver area. Whatever she could spare, Julia spent assisting poor families in her neighborhood. When her resources were inadequate, she begged for food, fuel and clothing for the needy. Julia entered the Catholic Church at Sacred Heart Parish in Denver in 1880 and had a devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. A daily communicant, Julia had a rich devotion to the Blessed Sacrament and the Blessed Virgin and continued her prayers while working and moving about. She joined the Secular Franciscan Order in 1901 and was active in It until her death in 1918.



his mother and siblings by crossing the Mississippi River into freed Illinois. Impressed by Augustus' intelligence and piety, several priests tried to get him into the seminary which proved to be impossible. In 1880 Augustus began his priestly studies in Rome. He was ordained a priest on April 24, 1886. He is recognized as the first Black American priest. Fr. Tolton celebrated his first Mass in Quincy, Illinois before a large crowd of whites and blacks. The next day he was assigned to pastor at St. Joseph Church, a small poor black parish. Although his priesthood was hampered by isolation and economic hardship, Fr. Tolton remained a symbol of fidelity and priestly dignity. Pastor of St. Monica in Chicago, Fr. Tolton became the spiritual leader of the 19th century National Black Catholic Congress. He died at Mercy Hospital, a victim of heatstroke, on July 9, 1897.


