



Homeless Shelter Crisis Needs Immediate Attention



St. Monica parish actively supports the development and provides supplies needed for scatteredsite shelters serving diverse homeless groups. Project Haven is the program coordinated by REACH Advocacy, Inc. that shelters the hard-to-place unhoused. Budget projections fell short due to several factors, including public donations challenged by inflation, the gap between costs and revenue, and delays from county and state funding. Money from state agencies does not become

available until the wintertime Code Blue funding becomes available. Persons now living at Project Haven shelters face losing their housing and nutritional support services immediately unless Project Haven remains viable. Please consider donating to REACH Advocacy at <u>www.reachadvocacy.org</u>.



Creation Corner

The third section of Pope Francis' apostolic exhortation, Laudate Deum, addresses "A Growing Technocratic Paradigm." He describes this



as thinking that has "gone awry," as if "reality, goodness and truth automatically flow from technological and economic power." It then becomes easy "to accept the idea of unlimited growth." Yet he says that the greater problem is an "underlying obsession to increase human power beyond anything imaginable" in which "nonhuman reality is a mere resource at its disposal." Those with the knowledge and economic resources to use this expanded technology have gained "an impressive dominance over the whole of humanity" but "nothing to ensure that it will be used wisely."

We need to rethink the question of human power. What are its limits and meaning? "Not every increase in power represents progress for humanity." At times, our admiration of progress has blinded us to the horror of its consequences." Its development has not been "accompanied by a development in human responsibility, values and conscience." We do not have "sound ethics [or] a culture and spirituality genuinely capable of setting limits and teaching clear-minded selfrestraint."

"Human beings must be recognized as a part of nature." We cannot look at nature as the "setting" for our lives but must understand that "we are part of nature ... and thus in constant interaction with it." Further, "humans have often 'created' an environment, reshaping it in some way without destroying ... it. The great present-day problem is that the technocratic paradigm has destroyed that healthy and harmonious relationship."

"The ethical decadence of power is disguised thanks to marketing and false information. Whenever plans are made to undertake a project involving significant changes to the environment or high levels of contamination ... there does not seem to be any true interest in the future" of the people of the area, "since they are not clearly told" of the clearing of their lands and the resulting decline in the quality of their lives. It is "precisely the amassing of damages considered tolerable that has brought us to the situation in which we now find ourselves."

Pope Francis concludes this section with an admonition for all of us to ponder: "In conscience, and with an eye to the children who will pay for the harm done by their actions, the question of meaning inevitably arises: What is the meaning of my life? What is the meaning of my time on this earth? And what is the ultimate meaning of all my work and effort?"
