

St. Phoebe

St. Phoebe was a woman of great courage and deep love. She answered God's call to minister to God's people during the earliest days of the Church, when persecution against Christians was strong. She earned the trust of St. Paul, who depended on her to handle communications with the ecclesial community in Rome. In the Letter to the Romans, St. Paul commends St. Phoebe to the church in Rome, introduces her as a deacon (diakonos) of the church at Cenchreae, and asks that they "receive her in the Lord" (Romans 16:1-3). Come celebrate St. Phoebe's Feast Day as church leaders prepare to gather in Rome in October for the General Assembly of the Synod. Among the themes considered at the synod will be women's participation in the Church, both broadly and specifically as deacons.

Creation Corner

Something new will be arriving in our Butterfly and Pollinator garden very soon. We are adding a Bee Hotel. Why would we want do that, you ask? Well, we're all pretty well acquainted with bumblebees and honeybees, both of which live in hives. They are "social bees." However, most of the 4000 species of bees in the United States are solitary bees. Their lives are spent alone for the most part.

The solitary bees do most of the pollinating. Honeybees don't travel very far from the hive because they must make a round trip to bring the pollen back to the queen. But the solitary bees don't do that and thus they can travel great distances, allowing them to do more pollinating. They do, however, need place to rest and to lay their eggs. The female bees require a protected small place to lay the eggs. The solitary bees who don't live underground lay their eggs in hollow stems or decaying wood, where the larvae overwinter until they emerge in the spring.

The population of solitary bees is declining, and one reason is the lack of habitat for laying the eggs. A bee hotel can help with this problem. Ours will be a wooden block hotel with narrow channels drilled into the block. Come give it a visit and welcome the bees to their new winter home.
