Creation Corner



The second section of Pope Francis' *Laudate Deum* letter describes the state of the global climate crisis today. A friend who read it called this section "a punch in the gut." She's not wrong. This is difficult to read but it clearly lays out our current situation.

Pope Francis writes "Despite all attempts to deny, conceal, gloss over, or relativize the issue, the signs of climate change are already here and are increasingly evident," particularly as evidenced by the more frequent extreme weather phenomena. If we continue on our current path unabated, the temperature will continue to increase and heat waves will become more frequent and hotter. Icecaps of Greenland and Antarctica will melt completely and will result in immensely grave consequences for everyone.

Some choose to deride these facts. They point out that the Earth has always experienced periods of warming and cooling. They ignore, however, that instead of occurring over centuries or millennia, we have been able to perceive a rise in sea levels and melting of glaciers within a lifetime. Still others would hold the poor responsible since they have more children. "Yet the reality is that a low, richer percentage of the planet contaminates more of the planet than the poorest 50% of the total world population." As Pope Francis concludes, "It is no longer possible to doubt the human...origin of climate change."

It is frequently heard that reducing the use of fossil fuels and developing cleaner energy sources will lead to job losses. However, as Pope Francis states, as a result of the effects of climate change such as rising sea levels and droughts, millions of people are already losing jobs. But, he says, if properly managed, the transition to renewable energy is capable of generating countless jobs in different sectors.

The link between the climate phenomena and increased greenhouse gas emissions, especially since the mid-twentieth century cannot be ignored. Pope Francis writes "I feel obligated to make these clarifications, which may appear obvious, because of certain dismissive and scarcely reasonable opinions that I encounter, even within the Catholic Church. Yet we can no longer doubt that...these dangerous changes...have to do with unchecked human intervention on nature in the past two centuries."

"Some effects of the climate crisis are already irreversible, at least for several hundred years, such as the increase in the global temperature of the oceans, their acidification and the decrease of oxygen." Quoting further, "the same can be said about the decrease in continental ice sheets. The melting of the poles will not be able to be reversed for hundreds of years" and "we are now unable to halt the enormous damage we have caused. We barely have time to prevent even more tragic damage."

"Finally, we can add that the COVID-19 pandemic brought out the close relation of human life with that of other living beings and with the natural environment. But in a special way, it confirmed that what happens in one part of the world has repercussions on the entire planet. This allows me to reiterate two convictions that I repeat over and over again: 'Everything is connected' and 'No one is saved alone'."
